TO CREATE and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.

TO PROMOTE the principles of good government and good citizenship.

TO TAKE an active interest in the civic, cultural, social and moral welfare of the community.

TO UNITE the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.

TO PROVIDE a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest; provided, however, that partisan politics and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.

TO ENCOURAGE service-minded people to serve their community without personal financial reward, and to encourage efficiency and promote high ethical standards in commerce, industry, professions, public works and private endeavors.



LIONS CODE OF ETHICS

TO SHOW my faith in the worthiness of my vocation by industrious application to the end that I may merit a reputation for quality of service.

TO SEEK success and to demand all fair remuneration or profit as my just due, but to accept no profit or success at the price of my own self-respect lost because of unfair advantage taken or because of questionable acts on my part.

TO REMEMBER that in building up my business it is not necessary to tear down another's; to be loyal to my clients or customers and true to myself.

WHENEVER a doubt arises as to the right or ethics of my position or action towards others, to resolve such doubt against myself.

TO HOLD friendship as an end and not a means. To hold that true friendship exists not on account of the service performed by one another, but that true friendship demands nothing but accepts service in the spirit in which it is given.

ALWAYS to bear in mind my obligations as a citizen to my nation, my state, and my community, as to give them my unswerving loyalty in work, act, and deed. To give them freely of my time, labor and means.

TO AID others by giving my sympathy to those in distress, my aid to the weak, and my substance to the needy.

TO BE CAREFUL with my criticism and liberal with my praise; to build up and not destroy.

LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL HISTORY

LIONS – Liberty, Intelligence, Our Nations Safety

It all began as a dream of a Chicago businessman named Melvin Jones in the beginning of 20th century. Mr Jones had a great vision of local business clubs expanding their horizons from pure professional concerns to the betterment of not only their communities, but beyond.

He soon joined the Business Circle, a businessmen's luncheon group and was shortly elected secretary. This group was one of many at that time devoted solely to promoting the financial interests of their membership. Melvin Jones, however, had other plans. "What if these men," he asked, "who are successful because of their drive, intelligence and ambition, were to put their talents to work improving their communities?" Thus, at his invitation, delegates from men's clubs met in Chicago to lay the groundwork for such an organisation. An organisational meeting took place on 7 June 1917 in Chicago, Illinois, USA. "Association of Lions Clubs" then came into being.

A national convention was then held in Dallas, Texas, USA later in October of the same year. The constitution, by-laws, objects and code of ethics were established and approved during this meeting. Among the objects adopted in those forming years was one which read, "No club shall hold out the financial betterment of its members as its object". Such call for unselfish service to others remains one of the association's main tenets to date.

Melvin Jones eventually abandoned his insurance agency to devote himself full time to Lions and under his dynamic leadership; Lions Clubs earned the prestige necessary to attract civic-minded members.

One of his greatest honours was in 1945 when he represented Lions Clubs International as a consultant in San Francisco, California, at the organisation of the United Nations. Till today, Lions Clubs continues to hold consultative status with the United Nations.

In 1920, just three years after its formation, the association turned international when the first Canadian club was established. Major expansion, both nationally and internationally continued, particularly throughout Europe, Asia and Africa during the 1950's and 1960's.



Melvin Jones Founder of Lions Clubs International



"You can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else"

Melvin Jones was born on 13 January 1879 in Fort Thomas, Arizona, the son of a United States Army captain who commanded a troop of scouts. Later, his father was transferred and the family moved east. As a young man, Melvin Jones made his home in Chicago, Illinois, became associated with an insurance firm and in 1913 formed his own agency.

Melvin Jones became a guiding principle for public-spirited people the world over. He died on 1 June 1961 at 82 years of age. On 30 June 1925, Helen Keller addressed the Lions Clubs International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio, USA. She challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in this crusade against darkness". She said, "I am your opportunity. I am knocking at your door."

Her request to the Lions inspired Lions Clubs International to adopt the Sight Conservation and Work with the Blind Programme as a major service initiative.

In addition to sight programmes, Lions Clubs International is also committed to providing services for youth, improving the environment, building homes for the disabled, supporting diabetes education, conducting hearing programmes and providing disaster relief around the world through their foundation.

With the guiding principles enshrined in our Lions Purposes and Code of Ethics, Lionism has become a daily bread for over 1.3 million people throughout the whole world adding more life into their years and more years into their life.

Lionism calls for every Lion to bring out the best in him/her and promotes personal growth through "Service Above Self" based on 3 CORE VALUES. The core values are:

- 1) BE A BETTER PERSON
- 2) BUILD A BETTER COMMUNITY
- 3) BE A CITIZEN OF THE WORLD

Helen Keller



Helen Keller was born on 27 June 1880 in Tuscumbia, Alabama, USA. As a child , she developed a fever at 18 months of age, thereafter she became blind, deaf and mute.

At age 6, her teacher Anne Mansfield Sullivan taught Keller sign language & Braille. At age 10, Keller learned to speak. In 1898, Helen entered the Cambridge College and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree cum laude in 1904. In 1915, Keller joined the first Board of Directors of the Permanent blind Relief War Fund (later known as the American Braille Press). In 1924, the young woman started the Helen Keller Endowment fund as well as joining the staff of the American Foundation for the blind as a counselor on national and international relations.

Keller died on 1 June 1968 at age 87.





1958	Charter of Lions Club of Singapore on 5 Nov 1958.
1959	Charter of Lions Club of Kuala Lumpur Host on 18 Feb 1959.
1961	FY 1961~1962 - Set up of Provisional District 308 - The late Minoo Warden (Host) was appointed 1 st DG.
1962	FY 1962~1963 - Tan Kim Hong (East) was appointed the 2 nd DG.
1963	The late Eng Ah Khoon (East) was appointed 3 rd DG. Provisional District 308 first convention was held in Federal Hotel, KL.
1964	Provisional District 308 Second Convention was held in Victoria Memorial Hall, Singapore.
1965	FY 1964~1965 and 1965~1966 - 4 th DG C. W. Chen (East) was appointed.
1966	Charter of Lions Club Kota Kinabalu Host on 4 Oct 1966 and Lions Club Kuching Host on 15 Oct 1966.
1967	District has over 20 clubs and its provisional status was dropped. Late Eng Ah Khoon was elected as 1 st DG of District 308 (1967~1968).
1970	Charter of Lions Club of Brunei Host on 6 Nov 1970.
1971	Singapore hosted its first OSEAL to 1,000 delegates with the late DG Peter Y.S. Fu (East) as Organising Chairman.
1975	Lioness programme approved in LCI.

1976	Lioness programme from LCI arrived in Singapore. Lioness Clubs of Singapore were formed.
	Our first LEO Club, Leo Club of Singapore Central sponsored by LCS Central was chartered on 7 Aug 1976.
1977	Then DPM Dr Toh Chin Chye highlighted a major challenge for Singapore would be the care and support of our fast growing elderly population.
1978	Late PCC H. K. Lau (Central) formed a steering committee to explore possibility of building a home for elderly persons.
1979	Late PCC H. K. Lau, who was the DG then, assembled a group of Lions namely, ZCs T. S. Fung, P. T. Wong, DDG Edwin Chan and Lion Henry Kwek to work on the Lions Home project.
1980	18-bed nursing home launched by founding Chairman Henry Kwek in Ang Mo Kio Ave 10.
1981	By 1981, the clubs in District 308 numbered 73, comprising 2,439 Lions and the following year there were 2,598 Lions in 81 clubs.
1982	A resolution to re-district into a multiple district of 2 sub-districts viz: 308-A and 308-B, was adopted at the 1982 District Convention at Genting Highlands
1983	Late DG Peter Y. S. Fu was selected as 1 st Council Chairman, Alec Chin (East) was elected 1 st DG of 308-A and P. S. Ron (Kulim) elected 1 st DG of 308-B.

1985	Singapore hosted its 2 nd OSEAL to 4,500 delegates. PCC Peter Fu was the Organising Chairman again. It was the largest Lions conference ever to be held in Singapore. A 45-bed Lions Nursing Home (LNH) was built at 41 Toa Payoh Rise. 2005	LHE celebrated its 25 years of community service with a year-long celebration and festivity.
2006	Tthe first District Charity Golf event was held with \$80,000 in proceeds going to Lions Home, Lions Befrienders and Lions Foundation.
2007	District Secretariat is formalised and becomes permanent.
2008	District 308-A1 Website voted as 'Best Website Worldwide' by LCI.
	Lions Clubs of Singapore celebrates 50 Years of Community Service.
2009	The Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund - The Lions movement in Singapore under the encouragement of the District and LCI raised S\$27,996.19 for the earthquake victims of Haiti.
2010	The Singapore Chingay Parade 2010 saw a participation of about 800 Lions/Leos with family members, volunteers and supporters on each night of 19 th and 20 th February 2010. The Lions Contingent, with its distinctive and widely recognised yellow Lions vests, was led by

DG Anthony Tay & Second International Vice President Dr Tam Wing Kun. They were accompanied by International Director Hjh Ellis Suriyati, Council Chairperson Simon Koh and our IPDG Bobby Eng.

The event reached out to millions around the world through the live telecasts on Channel 5, 8 and Channel News Asia. And the audience world-wide heard the mighty roars of the Lions of Singapore.

A joint project between Lions Clubs from District 308-A1 and A2 was held from 10-14 October 2010 in East Malaysia. This was a cycling event from Kuching to Miri and aptly called The Sarawak Charity Ride 2010.

The District Bulletin received Honourable Mention in the Lions Clubs International Contest Rules for the District Newsletter (Bulletin).

- 2011 Three clubs were chartered during FY 2010/2011: 1) LCS Marine Parade 2) LCS Bukit Merah 3) LCS Garden City
 - Lions visited Sri Lanka at the invitation of Lions of District 306-C2 and were met by DG Lal Manualge. The Lions made donations and distributed relief supplies to the areas affected by Tsunami in the South and Civil War in the North. Tree Planting was also done jointly with Lions Club of Maharagama Golden City. Another trip was made in May 2012 to build a shelter for needy children to hold education classes and also a home for a destitute family.

WHO INTRODUCED LIONISM TO SINGAPORE?



Every Lion knows who Melvin Jones is. But, how many of us, Lions, in MD308 know who PID Noshir Pundole is? How many of us know who introduced Lionism to us 60 years ago?

Yes, this man is none other than PID Noshir Pundole!

Noshir Pundole was born in March 1920 in India. He was a charter member of Lions Club of Bombay (now Mumbai Host).

Noshir's Lionistic journey began when he was invited by a British army officer by the name of William (Noshir could not remember his full name) to a Lions Club meeting sometime in 1951. He was so impressed with Lions Club's way of serving the community that after returning to Bombay, Noshir started looking into chartering the first Lions Club in Bombay. It took him several years to charter the Lions Club of Bombay, now Lions Club of Mumbai Host, but he finally managed to do so in 1956. Lion Noshir Pundole then became India's first District Governor in 1957 and again in 1958 and then International Director in 1964-1966.

PID Noshir's passion for Lionism did not stop at Bombay. He took Lionism with him to wherever he went on his business trips. He was in the travel agency business then and travelled to Singapore often where the manager of Air India was his good friend. His contacts for Lionism in Singapore were developed through this friend.

In 1957, PID Noshir had the opportunity to meet up with Behram R. Vakil, Prem P. Ohri and Naresh Rastogi. Needless to say, PID Noshir inspired them with Lionism. As a result, the four of them chartered the Lions Club of Singapore (now known as Lions Club of Singapore Host) on 5 November 1958. Three months later, Lions Club of Kuala Lumpur (now known as Lions Club of Kuala Lumpur Host) was chartered on 18 February 1959.

PID Noshir Pundole passed away in 2016 at the age of 96.

Lions Club of Singapore

Our Club's long-term market project, 'Food & Friends', was started in 1997. This project involves collecting vegetables and fruits every Saturday and distributing them to more than 2,800 beneficiaries all over Singapore. Over the years, it grew from being a one-club project to become a joint project with six clubs. In 2017 this project was renamed 'Vegetable Charity Drive'.

Since our club's inception in 1986, our members have been organising 'Hot Meals' every Sunday, serving the seniors in various parts of Singapore. A total of 215 beneficiaries enjoy our food every month. This exclude the ad-hoc meals that we serve occasionally.

Every day over the past ten years, our members collect 'nonya kueh' donated from a cake factory and distribute 300 pieces of the kueh to a charity home. More than 2,100 pieces of the kueh are distributed each week.

Over the years LCS Amber has supplied pyjamas, bath towels, blips, and face towels to all the residents of the Lions Homes at Bedok and Bishan.

Overseas Projects

Our Club has also been active in supporting charities outside Singapore.



For the last 20 years we have organised overseas missions, especially to Thailand. Each year Amber Lions travel to Mae Sot and Chiang Mai in Thailand to serve the less fortunate there. We invite members from various Lions Clubs as well as non-Lion volunteers to join in these overseas charity missions. Over the years we have built schools in Thailand and Myanmar and supported a hospital in Mae Sot, Thailand. Once in every three months for the last few years, we ship a 40-ft container of rice, noodles, biscuits, used clothes, hospital beds, wheel chairs, etc., to Thailand. These items are for Mae Tao Clinic-hospital and other societies caring for the less fortunate there.

Every month since 2017, LCS Amber, with support from donors, sends S\$1,000 to the Mae Tao Clinic-Hospital in Thailand to help them pay for medicine and food.

All the above are ongoing long term projects of Lions Club of Singapore Amber. Our Club will also continue to support other joint projects of the District, LBSA, LHE and other Clubs.





LCS Centennial was chartered in 2017. Our members believe strongly in advocacy and action for the vulnerable.

Grassroots Partnerships

Kickstarting our service activity in 2017, our Club partnered with grassroots organizations to embark on a large-scale community service outreach project benefitting disadvantaged elderly living in Teck Ghee. It turned into a memorable event beyond what we imagined as we were both surprised and humbled by PM Lee's visit.

That same year, we managed to set the Guinness World Record for having the longest string of Happy Mother's Day cards put together. We have since continued strong partnerships with grassroots organisations to reach out to disadvantaged communities across Singapore, offering beyond hot food – free eye and health checks, sponsored spectacles, entertainment programming, and free manicures, pedicures & haircuts.

Club Initiatives

Our Club embarked on a social impact trip to Myanmar in 2018. Spreading our care to communities across borders, this inaugural trip brought our members to an orphanage serving 150 homeless and underprivileged children near Yangon. Children aged 5 to 15 benefitted from the infusion of clothing, school supplies and necessities donated and/or sponsored by our Club. We ensured eye checks and specialized eyewear were provided to the children whose eyes were affected by long hours of field work in the sun. There

were plenty of cross-cultural friendships and mentoring to go around.

Other initiatives that our Club has supported include fundraisers such as "Walk for Rice" in which our members helped supply 16,000 bowls of rice for underprivileged families, a charity car wash that raised \$11,000 for the Foreign Domestic Worker Association for Social Support and Training, and a painting auction that fetched \$4,800.





LCS Participation

We are proud of our active participation in Lions International initiatives such as Lions Save Sight and Lions Flag Day.

In addition, our Club proudly supports our members who are advocates of causes they believe in. One such example is Lion Serene Quek who has spoken out in the media to raise awareness and to challenge social stigma towards people with mental health conditions. Similarly, other members are involved in causes such as early detection of diabetes in conjunction with World Diabetes Day.

Guided by the motto "We Serve," our members have a constant restlessness to do things better each time. We experiment to find better ways to achieve social impact and outreach and continue to champion the causes we believe in.



LCS Central, the third oldest Lions Club in Singapore, was chartered 57 years ago on 10 March 1962. Sponsored by LCS East, with the guiding impetus from our Charter President the late Lion Phua Ngiap Theng, Lion Felix Chen and Lion Kang Tech Kiat, our Club was established with 20 founding members.

Since then, our Club has grown, sponsoring the Charter of four local clubs and twinning with seven sister clubs from countries in the Asian region. Currently, our membership has grown to 40, with members ranging from 28 to 91 years of age, of which 40% are female.

Our Service Projects

Through humanitarian and service projects, our Club has extended its hand in aid of the less fortunate.

Since the eighties, we have directed our focus towards fostering the spirit of caring and sharing of the lonely and needy citizens from Senior Activities Centres and residents of care institutions. We bring joy to them by socialising events where meals are provided. One of our signature projects is a rooftop event, overlooking the National Day celebrations, which we have organised for the elderly and underprivileged for the past 5 years.

The birth of Lions Club of Singapore Clarke Quay was attributed to a gentleman, John Tan Ah Muay and his pioneer team who decided to charter a new club on 7 March 1995. That marks the beginning of a new all-man Lions club of which 18 members were from Lions Club of Singapore West. There have been many changes since then. In 2012, the Club opened its door to ladies and in 2013 admitted foreign talents too resulting in much vibrancy.

We have many dedicated and outstanding members who served in various Cabinet under different District Governors. We have the distinction and privilege of Past District Governor Lion William Kwok who was elected in 1999 and the very dynamic and affable Past President SK Ho, who rejuvenated the club with much verve and vitality after he joined in 2012. Our very first lady president was Lion Lena Chen who joined in 2012 and served two terms as President. Her second year gave birth to our first Extension Club when 7 members left to charter Oxley.

Our Club has twinned with 8 Lions Clubs overseas with two each in Malaysia and Taiwan and one in Thailand, Philippines, Indonesia and Hong Kong. Even though we faced many setbacks throughout this project, our team was blessed that we overcame all the obstacles









The following are the major projects carried out by LCS East over the last decade.

1) Friday Market Project

This signature project was started 30 years ago by Lion Looi Im Heok because he wanted to help the Charity Homes defray their food costs. He therefore urged the wholesalers in Pasir Panjang Market to donate some of their fresh produce via the Lions Movement to the Charity Homes. So, every Friday, the wholesalers in Pasir Panjang Wholesale Market donate fresh vegetables and fruits to the Lions on site, who then arrange for the items to be transported to the distribution point at Kebun Bahru Market. This Donation is further supplemented by contributions from the stall-holders of Kebun Bahru Market and other well-wishers. Currently, five other Lions Clubs are jointly undertaking this project. With manpower assistance from the 13 recipient Homes, the Lions at the distribution point send the items to the various Homes based on the size of the Homes' operations. About one ton of items is distributed every Friday. The fresh produce reduces the food costs of the Homes and, as a result, the Homes can better allocate their funds to other needs.

2) Siem Reap Shoes Project (Cambodia)

LCS East and the Lioness Club of Singapore, carried out a project in Seam Reap from 25-30



November 2014, distributing 500 pair of shoes to school children in three schools. This project was undertaken with the support of the Principal of St Stephens School (Singapore) who inspired his students to donate their unused and good shoes to help their peers in Cambodia. Two teachers and a well-wisher, Mr James Teo, also jointly worked on this project. Mr Teo also donated 100 bicycles, 150 pairs of school uniforms, desks, chairs and blackboards to the school children and schools in Seam Reap. St Stephens School continues to work with our Club, donating school shoes for the children of Cambodia, and our Club works with other organisations to enable this project to continue.

3) Ghim Moh Hot Meals Project

Our Club provides hot meals to the seniors at the Lions Befrienders Service Centre in Ghim Moh every two months since 2014. It is our Club's commitment to engage the seniors living on their own and make them participate in social life. Our members and the members of the Leo Club of Temasek Junior College (our sponsored Club) provide hot lunch, engage in sing-a-long sessions, play Bingo, teach arts and craft making, exercise routines etc. so that the seniors can be mentally and physically active and feel part of the community.

4) Xmas project at Bedok LHE

Our Club organises a party every year at the Lions Home for the Elders (Bedok). We pamper the residents there with traditional delicacies, durians, etc. We also give the residents blouses, pajamas so that they can have a fresh change of clothes. This project brings cheer and happiness to the residents.



LCS Fort Canning was chartered on 7 March 1988 in Multiple District 308 (Brunei/Malaysia/ Singapore). Over the years, the Club is privileged and proud to have served and made contributions to our community.

Our Club was formed with a strong heritage as most of our charter members were members of Leo Club of Singapore City, one of the Top 10 Leo Clubs in the world in 1981. We have members who have been active in Lionism since 1973.

As Leos (like the Lions and Lionesses), we were united by a common interest in doing charity work and we were also eager to continue participating in activities beneficial to the Community long after our term as Leos was over.

Recognising our capabilities and potential, the LCS Host asked us to seriously consider converting our Leo Club to a Lions Club.

The name Fort Canning has strong affinity to the charter members as they used to hold Leo meetings at the parish hall of the Church of Sacred Heart right opposite Fort Canning Hill.

Our Club members meet twice every month on every first Sunday (Project and meeting) and third Thursday of the month.



Our regular and long term Projects & Service Activities include:

- AWWA Senior Citizens Home monthly hotmeal lunch, our long-term project for the past 28 years.
- Lions Home for the Elders support for and participate in the Home's projects and activities.
- Lions Befrienders support for and participate in LB's projects and activities.
- Musical events such as William Shakespeare's "Midsummer Night's Dream" and Charles Dickens' "Scrooge" and numerous movie premieres were organised for the underprivileged.
- Water for Living, Books for Learning Outreach project to build homes and libraries of English books for underprivileged and atrisk children in countries like Laos, Cambodia and Thailand.

- Lions SaveSight Centre (Singapore) Registered on 1 July 2008, this is a centre for the prevention of blindness (Founding Lions Clubs are LCS Host, LCS Fort Canning, LCS City and LCS Metropolitan)
- Lions Heart Charity Art Exhibitions now into its 3rd edition since 2015, to raise funds for Lions programmes through sales of Artworks by Lions.
- Annual Joint Projects Mid-Autumn Festival and Chinese New Year "Loh Hei" Dinner – held annually since 1997, these celebrations have been well-attended by seniors served by AWWA and LBSA.
- Children'sDayParty-organisedannuallyforthe past 34 years to entertain the underprivileged children from various homes. In recent years, the theme becomes Multi-generation Party, essentially creating opportunities for the children from underprivileged families to perform community service.

LCS Island celebrated its 25th anniversary in October 2017 together with our sponsor club, LCS Jurong who celebrated their 50TH anniversary. Our Club continues to serve within Singapore and the neighbouring countries. Some of our significant projects over the past decade are described below:

July 2010: Donation to Tangkak Kidney Renal Centre during its official opening ceremony. The centre was set up by Lions Club of Tangkak, Johor/Malaysia, which is our twin club.

March 2012: Together with LCS Serangoon Gardens, some of our members visited Yayasan Vihara Buddna Djepa Orphanage in Karimum, Indonesia. We distributed stationery items for the children, and visited the administrative office set up with used furniture donated by Temasek Polytechnic.

April 2012: We sponsored 10 bicycles for students from Riverkids Foundation in Siem Reap, Cambodia.

May 2014/2015: In 2014, through the contact of a Lion, Temasek Polytechnic donated thousands of textbooks as it was digitising its library. Another Lion from LCS Serangoon Gardens, Dr Sein Min who was a University lecturer in Myanmar, secured sponsorship to

ship the books to Myanmar. Both Clubs packed the 20,000 books and 6,000 VHS tapes into a 40 ft container and shipped it to Yangon. In early 2015, we visited Yangon to witness the handover of the books to several universities.

June 2016: While visiting Bhutan, five of our members planted trees on a hilltop together with members from Lions Club of Bhutan. The Lions from Bhutan helped to organise visit to a Girls Home where we donated groceries, chickpeas, rice, etc. The then International 1st Vice President, Lion Bob Cowley was also present at the visit. **December 2016:** Lions from LCS Serangoon Gardens and Island visited the Aye Yeak Mon Girls' Orphanage in Mandalay. We donated food, stationery, toiletries and money to cover the cost of meals for one month. We also contributed money to fund the meal and upkeep of 90 destitute elderly in the century old Mingun Buddhist Home for the Aged.

Fund raising projects

 Annual Christmas carnival at Singapore Children's Charities Association (SCCA). Our Club set up stalls to sell drinks, soft toys, ladies accessories, and the funds raised were donated to SCCA. In September 2014, our Club was awarded long service (26 years) and Partner of SCCA awards.

- 2. Each year, our members participate in the Flag Day events of Lions Befrienders Service Association and Lions Home for the Elders. Members went on street collection as well as help to sort and count the money collected. Our Club and some members donated 4 beds to LHE's new home in Bishan.
- In 2010, with six other Clubs, we jointly organised a choral concert, the first in the Lions history. The concert raised about \$15,000 which were donated evenly to LHE, LB, and Lions Clubs Service Foundation.
- 4. In January 2016, our Club donated \$3500 to the first Lions Charity Show held in Singapore.



Our Club received its Charter on 6 March 1989 which means we are 30 this year (2019). Our sponsor club was LCS Tanglin where two of our founder members Andrew Yeo and Donald Wee cut their teeth as Lions. It was also a time when LCI was urging clubs to be inclusive by admitting women as full members. Our Club answered the call accordingly by having three women among its founding members.

In 1995 when the Singapore Government wanted to hand over its elderly befriending programme to a voluntary welfare organisation, some Lions leaders rallied Singapore clubs to take up the challenge. We are proud to be one of the three Lions Clubs in Singapore which took over the programme in 1995. The other two clubs were LCS North and LCS Stamford. Together we were the founder clubs of the Lions Befrienders Service Association (Singapore) or LBSA.

Since then our Club has been actively involved in the development and growth of LBSA. Our club is represented on the Management Committee of LBSA since its inception in 1995 until today while our Charter member Chan Chee Keong was Chairman of LBSA from 1999 to 2003. Our Club members sit on the Management Boards of Tampines (Charles Chau) and Ang Mo Kio (Lim Kim Hong) LB Senior Activity Centres. At the ground level we are very involved with the

activities of LBSA and the SACs like sponsoring hot meals, outings and outreach. We even adopted an 86-year-old befriendee living alone in Ang Mo Kio and took turns to visit him weekly and to take him for medical appointments.

Apart from LBSA we also support initiatives of the Lions Home and the District by participating in fund-raising and awareness events. We discharge our obligations as a responsible Lions Club by attending Conventions and AGMs. Our Club has many Lions trainers in its history and to carry on the proud tradition, one of our members, Dr Chey Chor Khoon is a facilitator

in the District Leadership Training Institute (DLTI) which conducts training for Lions in our District.

One of our recent significant projects was the "Books for Myanmar" initiative. In 2014 our regular service partner club LCS Island had information that Temasek Polytechnic had thousands of textbooks to give away as it was digitising its library. Serendipitously we have a member Dr Sein Min who was a University lecturer in Myanmar. He considered the books suitable for use in Myanmar universities and made the contacts. Together with LCS Island we packed the 20,000 books and 6,000 VHS tapes into a 40-ft container and shipped it to Yangon. In early 2015 our member Tham Joi Pun led a team of Lions to Yangon to hand over the books to several universities in a poignant ceremony.

Having made friends in Myanmar, Lions from LCS Island and our Club made another service trip to our Asean neighbour in late 2016. This time we visited the Aye Yeak Mon Girls' Orphanage in Mandalay. We donated food, stationery, toiletries and money to cover the cost of meals for one month. In addition, we contributed money to fund the meals and upkeep of 90 destitute elderly in the Mingun Buddhist Home for the Aged.

In addition to our regular service activities we have included the Association for Persons with Special Needs (APSN) for support in 2019. We support their work by holding our meetings at their social enterprise café, Mystical Café, located inside the Community Hub at Kampung Ubi. The cafe is a training centre for adults with mild intellectual disability. We also act as ambassadors to encourage others, including Lions clubs, to patronise the cafe.

As symbolised by our Lions emblem with the Lion facing east and west, we too are always seeking for opportunities to serve.

LCS Stamford was chartered on 17 December 1987. Our first President was Lion Colin Miles. Members comprised friends, business associates and old school mates.

We began our community service journey in a very modest way by supporting the efforts of the District, especially the Lions Home for the Elders by making regular visits and raising funds. Members also found time to visit other charity institutions to spend time with their residents, such as the Ubi Hostel that was a residential half-way house for the physically challenged.

When the Lions Befrienders Service Association (LB) was formed in 1975, our Club became one of the three founding members to facilitate the takeover and management of the befriending programme from the then Ministry of Community Development.

Since then, we have been actively involved in the activities and growth of LB, participating in its befriending and outreach programmes. Our members visit befriendees (lonely elderly living in one- and two-rooms public housing) to befriend and distribute rations to them every quarter.





Past District Governors' Reflections



PCC Anthony Cheong 1992-1993

"...physically challenging to traverse rivers and mountainous rough roads to visit Clubs in urban and rural East Malaysia..." My term as District Governor of District 308A in 1992-93 was both a memorable and exhilarating one. The District covered Singapore, peninsular Malaysia (up to Batu Pahat) and Sarawak, Sabah, including Brunei. Not only was it physically challenging to traverse rivers and mountainous rough roads to visit Clubs in urban and rural East Malaysia, but during my term, with the support of all Clubs in Brunei, Malaysia, and Singapore, we embarked on the "Journey for Sight".

This ambitious project, which began in Tawau, and ended in Kuala Lumpur, was carried out on 4-wheel-drive vehicles and raised over USD 200,000 in Melvin Jones Fellowships for LCIF, placing us as one of the top Districts in our Movement. The tremendous fellowship generated by this project was enjoyed by one and all along the journey.

With the admission of women into LCI as full Lions members in 1988, I had the opportunity of "converting" nearly all Lioness Clubs in Malaysia and Singapore to be fully fledged Lions Club members.

These were my two main contributions to Lionism during my term of office with the help and support of my Cabinet officers, Club Presidents, fellow Lion members, and Past Officers of the Association.



PDG Isabel Cheong 2006-2007 The Lions Movement in Singapore continues to grow in leaps and bounds with now over 80 Lions Clubs with over 2,000 members in this small island nation.

There is no doubt that with the more extensive reach into the community from the "many helping hands", more disadvantaged and lonely elderly are benefitting from the tireless efforts of many Lions members.

As a more than 35-year old Past District Governor and Lion member, I continue to be amazed at the energies and activities of the Lions clubs. It is my hope that with the constant renewal of new members into our organisation, Lionism in Singapore will continue to make a considerable impact in

the community. I am indeed gratified that many "senior" Lions and Past Officers willingly contribute their time, knowledge and experience to build up our Movement.

I have had the privilege to have served as the Chairman of the Lions Home of the Elders for the past 4 years – an establishment which, together with the Lions Befrienders, has become the hallmark of what the Lions in Singapore has accomplished, to meet in particular, the needs of the ageing population in Singapore. I am confident that through these two "signature" programmes, as well as many other significant contributions, Lions members will collectively and harmoniously, work together to ensure that the Movement will be a vibrant, strong and progressive one.

May all Lions members share their common desire "To serve", and celebrate their differences in doing so.



I was installed as District Governor of District 308A1 at the 91st Lions International Convention held on 27 June 2008 in Bangkok by International President Al Brandel whose theme was "Miracles Through Service". A record number of 250 Singapore Lions attended my DG reception in one of the hotels in Bangkok.

In that fiscal year, we celebrated 50 Years of Community Service (50Y Celebration). As part of 50Y celebrations:

- Two full page 50Y publicity advertisements with messages from Prime Minister Mr Lee Hsien Loong were put up in the Chinese and English national newspapers to commemorate this milestone of Lions' contribution to the society.
- About 1,700 elderly residents of various homes for the aged in Singapore, as well as needy elderly and children were invited to the celebration dinner which was totally sponsored by Lions and wellwishers. Joining in and involving personally in serving food to the needy elderly and children were about 400 Lions including Guest of Honour International Director Ellis Suriyati, Special Guest MP Lee Bee Wah and Council Chairperson Patrick Chew.

- A souvenir coffee book called 50Y Lions Heritage book, commemorative souvenir T-shirts and caps and commemorative 50 years celebration Lions stamps were also launched.
- A Gift of Sight Symposium was jointly organised by District, Singapore National Eye Centre and Thomson Community Club.

During the fiscal year, the District also launched the Singapore Lions Education Fund. For a start, 10 bursaries were presented to the needy undergraduate students in National University of Singapore and 5 awards to the needy undergraduate students in the Singapore Management University.

District 308-A1 also won the first place in the website contest-District Category for fiscal year 2008-2009.



PDG Steven Seah 2010-2011 WE SERVE - These two words describe the core of being a Lion. And a Lion in any capacity.

When I took office as District Governor in July 2010, I did my best not to forget that it is all about serving and service. Being elected to lead the Lions in District 308-A1 is a responsibility not to be taken lightly. The attitude of a servant leader was important to cultivate. You are not elected to be a dictator or enforcer. You are not designed to be King of the Lions.

To be effective and sincere in being a servant leader, you need two significant traits – humility and compassion. Devoid of these qualities, your decisions may seem personal and emotional and at best controversial.

The Governor should be a leader that unites and not divides. He should embrace all Lions – putting aside personal differences or dislikes.

We are human and have our failings but this is a poor excuse for not acting with humility and compassion when one holds the highest office in the District.

My term as Governor was a satisfying one. The lesson I learned is that if you want to encourage more Lions to take the challenge of leadership in a positive manner, you need to be a true servant leader. A benign leadership is what I practised – a leadership style I believe resonates with many Lions.

I do hope that I have succeeded as a Governor to show servant leadership qualities and I am always guided by Proverbs 27:19: *"As water reflects a face, so a man's heart reflects the man."*

To those who aspire to this office, do not try to imitate the style or approach of Past District Governors mindlessly and carelessly. Be discerning and wise when you wish to do so. You are your own person. You have your own way of doing things.

You would want to distinguish yourself in your role as District Governor. By all means do so with the mind and heart of a servant leader.

The acronym PDG used for the term Past District Governor describes those who held the office of District Governor. On a lighter note, PDG is also said to be an acronym for Permanent Dinner Guest or Paying Dinner Guest, among others.

It is hoped that as future leaders practise servant leadership, PDG will be connected to leadership that is Purposeful, Dignified and Gentlemanly.



DISTRICT LIONS TRAINING INSTITUTE



The District Lions Training Institute (DLTI) was established by a resolution passed by delegates at the District Convention in 2014 to provide more effective training for Lions through coordinated training activities in the District. The DLTI is part of the organisational structure of District 308-A1 and functions as the training arm of the District.

PCC Dr Winston Koh was initially appointed as Chairman for a duration of 3 years, and tasked to set it up and bring about its functioning. He was subsequently re-appointed as Chairman for another 3-year term from 2017-2020.

Vision

Effective leadership training for every Lion

Mission

To establish a Centre of Excellence for developing leadership capabilities of Lions to better serve the community

DLTI Functions

- 1. Promote and provide continuity in the leadership development of Lions in the District.
- 2. Establish and maintain a group of District Facilitators to meet training needs.
- 3. Conduct training for Lions in the District and Club and Cabinet levels.
- 4. Attend to the needs, welfare and continuous development of Facilitators.

- 5. Advise the District in developing specific curriculum and training materials for various training programmes.
- Collate, archive and keep records of training materials which will form part of the DLTI library.
- 7. Review training requirements to meet the overall training needs of the District.
- 8. Work closely with the District Global Action Team to achieve training objectives.

Administration

A Committee, headed by DLTI Chairman is responsible for initiating and deciding on plans, policies and activities pertaining to training in the District. The Committee includes the members of DG Team and the District GAT.

Activities include

- 1. Regular Facilitator and Committee meetings
- 2. Continuing development and training of new and current Facilitators
- 3. Curriculum planning and conducting orientation of Club Officers and Cabinet Officers
- 4. Conducting orientation for new members
- 5. Conducting Club Excellence Process (CEP) workshops
- 6. Organising Annual District Facilitators' Retreat

LIONS HOME FOR THE ELDERS



Affiliated to National Council of Social Service.



Lions Home was awarded by the Charity Transparency Award 2018 (CTA) under the large charity category on 29 Nov 2018. An initiative introduced in 2016 by the Charity Council, the CTA aims to encourage good governance and disclosure practices in the charity sector.



The Community Care Excellence Awards recognise the contributions of Community Care staff and teams who have demonstrated exemplary service and commitment in delivering quality care.

About Us

Lions Home for the Elders is a Voluntary Welfare Organisation (VWO) that actively promotes and employs best practices in providing services and programmes for the ageing community.

Initiated and established by Lions Clubs of Singapore, Lions Home for the Elders offers a spectrum of Aged Care services, caregiver and family support to assist families to meet the challenges of loved ones growing old. Our first community home was founded in 1980 and it housed 18 destitute and elderly residents. Over the years, we have expanded our services, capabilities and capacities to include a holistic approach in Aged Care.

Today, Lions Home operates two fully equipped well designed nursing homes at Bishan and Bedok South, with capacity to house a total of 384 residents. We have a team of 200 professional staff comprising nurses, care staff, doctors, allied health professionals such as physiotherapists, occupational therapists and speech therapists; as well as support services staff handling Social Welfare, Administration, Operations and Finance functions.

Vision, Mission and Goals

Vision

• The Recognised Leading Service Provider in Health, Nursing and Aged Care.

Mission

• Enabling the Elderly to Lead Enriched Lives through Holistic and Integrated Care.

Goals

- To provide love and care to all residents.
- To provide rehabilitation to residents aimed at maximising functional and cognitive abilities and to facilitate their return to the community and loved ones, whenever possible.
- To continually improve our standards and quality of care and services through research, training and education.

Milestones

The Lions Clubs of Singapore were very concerned that many elderly people who had been vital and productive during their working years had fallen on difficult times and had no place to turn to.

In 1980, our first community home for the aged and destitute elderly was started. Situated at a Housing and Development Board void deck at Ang Mo Kio Avenue 10, it was a modest start, providing free lodging for 18 residents.



In 1985, the Lions Clubs turned their attention to caring for the elderly sick, which required a high level of motivation and compassion. A nursing home at Toa Payoh Rise, using a converted World War II bomb shelter, was started. The nursing home catered for 45 residents.



In the meantime, the Lions Clubs secured a site at Bedok South Avenue 2 and a new building was completed on 9 March 1997, which accommodated 154 residents.



In October 2015, the residents from Toa Payoh Rise moved to the new Home in Bishan that has a total of 36 wards and 230 beds. Due to close proximity within the neighbourhood, the Home also set up a Senior Care Centre where residents are able to receive professional medical and nursing services which include Dementia Management, Rehabilitation and Recreational Therapy.

LIONS BEFRIENDERS SERVICE ASSOCIATION (SINGAPORE)





Lions Befrienders is a voluntary welfare organisation formed in 1995 by the Lions Clubs of Singapore. In 1999, we became a Lions District 308-A1 Project. LB has more than 20 years of history in working with the community to provide friendship and care for seniors to age in place with community participation, enabling them to enjoy meaningful and enriching lives. LB's integrated senior-centric approach addresses the needs of lonely seniors within the community. It has provided eldercare related services to more than 20,000 seniors since its inception. In 2018, our funder was changed from the Ministry of Social and Family Development (MSF) to the Ministry of Health (MOH) to address the predominance of health issues that our seniors are facing. Currently, we reach out to more than 5.000 vulnerable seniors islandwide through our Befriending and Community Outreach services.

Our Vision:

A nation where every senior is active, healthy and happy.

Our Mission:

To provide friendship and care for seniors to age in place with community participation, enabling them to enjoy meaningful and enriching lives.

Our Tagline:

Connecting Seniors, Enriching Lives.

Expansion of Befriending Service

Since our inception in 1995, LB has served more than 12,000 seniors and trained more than 3,000 befrienders. The islandwide Befriending Service reaches out to seniors at risk of social isolation and helps them to age in place within the community. Over the years, we expanded our outreach services by coordinating social and recreational activities sponsored by Lions Clubs and various community partners, corporations and individuals. In working with other eldercare voluntary welfare organisations and service providers to facilitate better co-ordination in the provision of community-based care services, we are committed to help enhance our seniors' quality of life.

Outreach

- 1. Expansion of Senior Activity Centres (SAC) LB currently operates 9 SACs and is commencing the third SAC in Clementi in 2019 (i.e.,10 SACs in total). Through our Community Outreach Services, we manage SACs that provide a wide array of meaningful activities and courses free-of-charge or at heavily subsidised rates to seniors.
 - i) Ghim Moh, Clementi and Tampines SACs were officially opened in 2013.
 - ii) The second SAC at Tampines was officially opened in 2016.



- iii) Ang Mo Kio and Bendemeer SAC were reopened in 2016 after renovation to serve our seniors better.
- iv) The second SAC in the Tampines/Changi Senior Cluster Network was officially opened in 2017.
- v) The second SAC in the Clementi/Bukit Timah Senior Cluster Network was officially opened in 2018.

2. Cluster Support (CS)

Inaugurated in 2014, SAC Cluster Support is an enhanced service for vulnerable seniors with no or weak family support, so that they can age-in-place within the community for as long as possible. Each SAC CS supports up to five SACs within their designated service boundaries. CS closely monitors the well-being of seniors from identified service boundaries through collaborations



with social service agencies and the help of Caring Assistance from Neighbours (CAN) carers.

- Queenstown Senior Cluster Network was officially opened in 2014.
- ii) Tampines/Changi Senior Cluster Network and interim Clementi/Bukit Timah Senior Cluster Network were officially opened in 2015.

3. Home Personal Care (HPC)

In 2017, we started the Home Personal Care (HPC) programme as a step-up service for vulnerable seniors who require assistance to continue living well at home or need help in supporting caregivers' duties. The staff assists the seniors to perform Activities of Daily Living and/or Instrumental Activities of Daily Living, in areas such as maintenance

exercises, light housekeeping, personal hygiene, recreational activities, grocery shopping and vital signs check. The programme aims to promote the seniors' well-being in the comfort of their homes and supplement the caregivers' aid as and when required.



 i) The Home Personal Care service in the Clementi/Bukit Senior Cluster Network and the Tampines/Changi Senior Cluster Network were officially operational in 2017.

4. Senior Group Home (SGH)

Commencing in 2015, the Senior Group Home (SGH) programme accords an assisted living model that reaches out to frail seniors, enabling them to co-reside independently in designated HDB rental flats retrofitted with elder-friendly features. SGH aims to provide comprehensive support to the seniors through services such as meals on wheels, medical escort transport and home nursing.

- i) The Senior Group Home in Tampines/ Changi Senior Cluster Network was officially opened in 2015.
- ii) The Senior Group Home at Mei Ling Street was officially opened in 2016.

Befrienders Day

The maiden Befrienders' Day in 2013 became an annual event to acknowledge the dedication and hard work of all LB befrienders. This is one of the little gestures to show them that LB values their time and efforts.

Giving Tree

In 2016, we launched Giving Tree, an initiative by LB that gives like-minded organisations the





perfect opportunity to give back to society. This enables us to help our seniors improve their wellbeing through our Befriending and Community Outreach Services, and to offer new services and eldercare facilities. Made up of wall-mounted embossed Giving Leaves or Giving Plaque, each leaf that sprouts from the Giving Tree is a token of recognition to acknowledge the generosity of organisations that donated to our cause.

Lions Befriending Walk

LB started the Lions Befriending Walk in 2007 and repeated their charity events in 2012, 2013 and 2019. The Lions Befriending Walk was organised to raise funds and awareness of social isolation amongst the seniors by engaging them in physical activity. The Walk provides opportunities for participants to interact with LB seniors and to experience the social befriending programmes tailored to facilitate active ageing for our lonely seniors.



Flag Day

LB organises Flag Day on an annual basis to raise funds needed to sustain the services rendered to the vulnerable seniors. The funds raised by our volunteers and donors help us to fend off social isolation as LB continues to help our seniors live enriching lives in their twilight years. In 2018, LB raised an unprecedented amount of donation and garnered the largest number of volunteers in LB Flag Day history.

Charity Golf

LB organised the Charity Golf fundraising event in 2014 and 2019. Through this event, LB hopes to fundraise and increase awareness among golfers and guests of the lonely and vulnerable seniors in our community and to sustain our senior-centric programmes.

Lions Charity Show 2016

LB and Lions Home for the Elders (LHE) organised an inaugural Lions Charity Show on 24 January 2016. LIONS COMMUNITY SERVICE FOUNDATION (SINGAPORE)



Vision

To be the leading source of philanthropic giving for the conduct of charitable services in Singapore from funds raised by Lions Clubs.

Mission

To be the focal organization for fiscal resources generated by Lions fund-raising activities and to extend the scope of tax-exempt donations to Lions causes in Singapore beyond services to the lonely, sick and poor elderly.

Background

The Lions Community Service Foundation (LCSF) was formally registered as a Charity in Singapore in 2003 to succeed the then District Foundation to fulfill the above Vision & Mission Statements. It is also an approved Institution of Public Character (IPC) entitling it to receive tax exempt donations.

Through LCSF, Lions Clubs in Singapore are encouraged to be united in their fund raising efforts to support our community service programmes with minimal public misunderstanding or confusion arising from individual Clubs and Lions programmes competing amongst each other in fund raising. Duly registered societies in District 308-A1 with a Lions Club Charter are members of LCSF.

LCSF aims to build an Endowment Fund from donations raised by its member clubs from the public which income would fund Lions community service activities, including the Lions Home For The Elders (LHE), Lions Befrienders Service Association (LBSA) and other Lions service projects.

Lions Clubs, non-Lion VWOs, educational institutions of all levels as well as individuals in need of financial assistance may apply for grants from LCSF to support their projects or bursary fund in accordance with established guidelines for the disbursement of LCSF funds. All applications by Lions Clubs must meet the pre-requisite grant criteria and be endorsed by the incumbent District Governor. Grants from LCSF are approved by its Board of Directors, Trustees or members in general meetings depending on the amount of grant applied for.

Financial Standing

To commemorate Singapore's 50th Anniversary, the NCSS Care and Share program matched every dollar raised by LCSF from 1 December 2013 through 31 March 2016. As a result of members' fundraising effort, the Care & Share matched fund received enabled LCSF to move to the next level of grant making with a base fund of \$3 million. This achievement over 15 years is remarkable considering that LCSF started with less than \$300,000 when it was registered as a charity in 2003. LCSF has been making grants of around a million dollars annually for the past few years. As a result LCSF is now classified as a mid-size Institute of Public Character.

With improved financial resources as well as better understanding as to what LCSF can do, many Lions Clubs are drawn closer together initiating projects towards making the community a better place for the disadvantaged, less fortunate sick and lonely, thus achieving an important objective of LCSF to unite clubs in community service.


In 2018, LCSF purchased an office space as a permanent facility to house its charitable operations as well as to provide a convenient meeting venue for Lions Clubs. It is also an effective hedge against inflationary effect on LCSF financial assets.

Financial Hardship Assistance

Students: The LCSF-administered Lions Education Fund was established by the District in 2008 as part of its 50 Years of Community Service celebrations, for the purpose of establishing scholarships, bursaries and other schemes to provide financial assistance to needy and deserving students. Lions Education Fund currently grants annual bursaries, book

prizes, food and transport allowance schemes to schools and institutions at all levels of learning in Singapore, covering primary, secondary, junior colleges, ITE and other skill training colleges, polytechnics as well as universities.

Families: The Foundation also provides financial assistance to families made destitute due to the sudden death or illness of the main breadwinner but did not meet the eligibility terms for government financial assistance.

Financial Assistance – Social needs

Residents of Welfare Homes: Lions Clubs through their weekly fresh grocery collection distribute fresh vegetables and other grocery items donated by wet market stallholders supplemented by tax-exempt donations by club members and their well-wishers.

Poor and Lonely Elderly: During festive occasions Lions Clubs organize festive treats for elderly residents of welfare homes and lonely elderly participants at neighborhood senior activity centers. LCSF funds such large scale festive treat activities which are conducted during Chinese New Year, Christmas, Hari Raya, Deepavali, National Day at restaurants, as well as monthly or weekly social gatherings mainly over lunch at the regional senior activity centers and even at the void decks where these elderly folks who live by themselves meet regularly to socialise.

Disadvantaged Youth: For the younger disadvantaged and residents of managed homes for youth, these festive treats usually take the form of outdoor activities and organised visits to places of interest e.g. zoo, Universal Studio rides, etc.

Financial Assistance – Enhancing capabilities

LCSF receives appeals for financial support from other local non-Lions charities. Its criteria for financial support is that our funding should be geared towards enhancing the capabilities of the charity appealing for grants. HCA Hospice is a very well established hospice in Singapore. They recently decided to extend their services to children diagnosed with life threatening illness and LCSF is funding the services of two social workers dedicated to serving the family care givers as well as to provide counseling and other services in the family's hour of need.

LCSF also assists "Kids Excel" service providers to raise funds to extend their tuition services in Mathematics and English to children aged 6 – 8 from poor family background in several constituencies that they had not previously served due to lack of funds.

Public education /awareness programs

Dementia Source Book: This publication by architectural students of NUS School was sponsored by LCSF and distributed to institutions involved in Dementia care and would be made available for public purchase at discounted prices to care givers involved in the design of dementia related premises.

Brain Tumor Society: In partnership with LCSF, the Society raises funds to promote awareness and support families of brain tumor patients in their financial and emotional needs.

Annual Public Forum: LCSF provides financial support for major events that promote sight conservation, preventable and reversible blindness, diabetes awareness and other health, wellness and environmental issues.

Local Application of LCI Programs

Lions Quest: LCSF conducts Skills for Adolescence Workshops facilitated by qualified Lions Quest Trainers for educationists including from ITE, social workers and Lions with an interest to work with Youth at Risk. LCSF is also looking into developing local case studies and localizing training curriculum/contents.

Lions Gift of Sight: One such application is the Lions Recycle for Sight (LRS). This project collects used spectacles from the community, sterilizes and recycles them by distributing to those with correctable vision problems. Due to high myopic rate in Singapore, LRS continues to collect thousands of used spectacles from the more than 100 collection points all over Singapore for the public to drop off their used spectacles. LCSF also funds regular sight screening projects organised by Lions Clubs together with grassroots organisations of various constituencies for their residents as part of the general health awareness programs.

Fight against Diabetes: Diabetes is becoming common in Singapore as a modern lifestyle illness and Lions International has adopted combating diabetes as its core service program. In Singapore there are major organisations providing dialysis facilities so the Lions contribution is focused on public education and the consequences of diabetes such as blindness and amputation of limbs, usually the legs. According to official statistics there are 4 amputations per day and the cost of prosthetic limbs that amputees may need to avoid being wheelchair-bound can be prohibitive to the average income earner. Lions have decided to establish a Prosthesis Center to provide free prosthetic limbs to deserving patients.

Recognition

Many Lions Clubs have raised funds for LCSF since it was registered as a charity and Institute of Public Character. It is hoped that more Lions Clubs will favourably consider to channel their fund raising efforts through LCSF tax-exempt donation facility as well as to benefit from LCSF grants for their projects that promote and achieve the objectives of the Lions movement in Singapore. In appreciation of the efforts to raise funds for LCSF charitable causes, an Award Scheme was established to recognize donors and fund raisers from the public, corporations, individuals as well as Lions and Lions Clubs. The Awards are presented annually at the LCSF Annual General Meeting.

Lions SaveSight Centre (Singapore) was registered with the Registrar of Societies on 1 July 2008.

Mission

Vision Care and Blindness Prevention for the underprivileged and vulnerable in our community.

In pursuit of Lions Clubs International global program on sight preservation, awareness and action, Lions SaveSight Centre (LSSC) endeavors to:

- Establish a centre for the prevention of blindness with strong emphasis on diabetes retinopathy, a blinding complication of diabetes
- Develop prevention of blindness program caused by cataract, glaucoma and corneal diseases
- Create care services, education & training, screening, counseling and research to complement current developments in the prevention of blindness
- Co-ordinate outreach prevention of blindness program to all seniors in our community
- Establish eye bank and corneal transplantation with links to LCI and its networks and links to sight conservation and eye banks

LSSC is supported by the majority of Lions Clubs in Singapore and has working partnerships with:

- Singapore National Eye Centre
- Singapore Eye Research Institute
- Lions Clubs International & District 308-A1 (Singapore)

LSSC's current activities include:

- Annual eye screening for the seniors in our community in conjunction with Lions World Sight Day
- Regular Eye Care lectures and talks to public and schools to educate our young on the importance of proper eye care
- Regular monthly and bi-monthly eye screening for seniors at selected Homes and Senior Activity Centres

The idea to start a Chapter in Singapore was mooted at the 90th International Convention in Boston, USA in 2006, following a meeting between PDG Anthony Cheong with then LISC President Thierry de Wandeleir and the current Secretary Michael Gelber at the LISC booth. Strong encouragement from them and armed with all the necessary materials provided, the impetus to introduce and start a Chapter in Singapore was fired.

The objective of LISC is to foster and develop the avocation of stamp collecting/trading amongst Lions, their families and the general public as an official activity of LCI.

Membership is open to all Lions in District 308-A1. Leos/non Lions will be Associate members. However, membership is not limited only to those with an interest in stamp collection. Anybody who is interested in community service through a different means is more than welcome to join the Chapter. In 2009 LISC Chapter 12 adopted a service project with the Association for Persons with Special Needs (APSN) including the Centre for Adults (CFA) whereby used stamps would be collected, repackaged and sold, giving the intellectually disabled meaningful employment. There are plans for this service project to be extended to grassroots organizations in the community. Through this, LISC hopes to highlight its activities to the general public as well as enhance the image of Lionism in Singapore.

To-date, Chapter 12 has successfully assisted the founding of Chapter 16 in our sister Sub-District 308-B2, with the first meeting and founding ceremony taking place in Penang, Malaysia in October 2012. Together with Chapter 16, Chapter 12 looks forward to bringing the LISC movement to our fellow Lions in the rest of the South East Asia region, and the People's Republic of China.

LEO CLUBS



An integral part of the Lions family, Leos also have their own global network of over 6,500 Leo clubs in more than 140 nations. This international scope fosters a unique global identity among Leos and Lions. Leo clubs provide young people with an opportunity for development and contribution, individually and collectively, as responsible members of the local, national and international community.

History & Objective

In 1957, the Glenside Lions Club from the U.S. state of Pennsylvania sponsored the world's first Leo club — the Abington High School Leo Club — with 35 students. A decade later, the LCI Board of Directors adopted the Leo Club Program as an official program of the association.

Through the Leo Club Program, young people develop and practise leadership, organisation and social skills through participation in Leo club activities and service projects. Involvement in these activities often fosters a lifetime commitment to helping others, while enhancing the community.

Motto

The Leo club motto — Leadership, Experience, Opportunity — says it all:

LEADERSHIP: Leo members acquire skills as project organizers and motivators of their peers. **EXPERIENCE:** They discover how teamwork and cooperation can bring about change in their community and the world.

OPPORTUNITY: Leos develop positive character traits and receive recognition for their contributions.

Types Of Leo Clubs

Whether based in the community or a school, Leo clubs provide members with the camaraderie and growth that come from participation in community service projects, social functions and leadership development activities.

Community-based Leo clubs offer membership to any eligible young person within the local area of the Lions club. These clubs meet at a suitable location in the community, and a member of the sponsoring Lions club serves as the Leo club advisor.

School-based Leo clubs draw on members from a school. These clubs often require the appointment of a faculty advisor — usually

a teacher, counselor or school administrator - to act as a liaison between the school and the Leo club. The faculty advisor also assists the Leo club advisor, who is a member of the sponsoring Lions club. The school must agree to fulfill Leo Club Program responsibilities and the Leo club must agree to follow the policies, insurance requirements and regulations of the school. The Leo club is subject to the same rules established by the school authorities for all student organizations and extracurricular activities. Before the Leo club is organized, the Lions club and school should agree on procedures for organizing club activities on and off school property, which adhere to school policies and LCI board policy. Leo clubs are also divided into two tracks: Alpha and Omega.

Alpha Leo clubs are designed for youth between 12 and 18 years of age. This track focuses on the individual and social development of teens and preteens.

Omega Leo clubs are tailored for young adults between 18 and 30 years of age. This track is designed for the personal and professional development of young adults.
